Pinemont Loop Off-Highway Vehicle Map Guide

WELCOME

The Hood River County Forestry Department manages 34,146 acres of land in Hood River County primarily for commercial timber production. These tree farm lands are open to the public and are also managed for recreation. Some of the trails in the East Area run from Hood River County property onto lands owned by others. The County is working with various agencies and private landowners so permission can be granted to allow public use of a few of these routes. In the meantime, make sure you have landowner permission before using trails. Ride responsibly and enjoy your visit to the Northwest Area Tree Farm.

REGULATION ENFORCEMENT

To protect resources, ensure safety, and enhance your recreation experience, regulations governing trail system development, management, and use on Hood River County lands have been adopted. Enforcement Officers from various agencies ensure compliance with these regulations throughout the forest. The Hood River County Sheriff Office receives ATV Grant Funding to patrol trails and staging areas.

RIDE AT YOUR OWN RISK

Many recreation activities are inherently dangerous. Always use caution when recreating on trails. Make sure you recreate within your ability and always wear the proper protective gear.

DRIVING DIRECTIONS

From I-84 to Pinemont Staging Area

1) From I-84 eastbound take Exit 64. Turn right onto White Salmon Highway (Hood River Bridge Road). Make an immediate right turn onto US-30/OR-35. Continue to follow OR-35 for ~10.4 miles. Make a left turn onto Pinemont Road (N-17) and drive for ~1.3 miles. Pinemont Staging Area is on the right hand side of the road. 2) From I-84 westbound take Exit 64 and turn left onto White Salmon Highway (Hood River Bridge Road). Travel for ~300 feet and make a right turn onto US-30/OR-35. Follow the remainder of the directions above.

TRAILS

Trails in the East Area are multiple-use. Different types of users are allowed to utilize the trails at the same time. Use caution while on these routes because you might encounter ATV's, motorcycles, bicycles, horse riders, runners, and hikers. Hood River County has adopted a trail policy which is: "Closed Unless Posted Open!" Each trail must have trail signage in place or the route is officially closed.

ROADS

All paved roads are closed to OHV use. You can legally cross a paved road at a right angle if an official OHV route crosses the road. Forest roads (gravel and native surface) on Hood River County Forestry property are shared-use. This means that non-street licensed Off-Highway Vehicles can legally use these routes as long as the routes appear on the OHV Map and do not have route closed signs in place. Some roads in the East Area are gated. You may find that some of the gates have been closed and locked. Do not ride around closed gates.

CHANGING TRAIL CONDITIONS AND ACCESSIBILITY

East Area trails are open for warm weather recreation primarily during the months of April through October. Many of these trails are covered under deep snow during winter. Trail conditions and difficulty levels may differ from what is shown on the trail map and trail signs because of changes in seasonal weather conditions. Individual trails may be closed at any time due to active forest management operations, ongoing project work, fire danger, or to prevent trail damage. The ongoing commitment of dedicated volunteers helps to promote a positive image of responsible trail use and ensures future trail access on Hood River County's Tree Farm.

TRAIL ADOPTION – THE TRAILS NEED YOU

Hood River County has an active Trail Adoption Program. The goal of the program is for 100% of trails to be adopted. All HRC recreation trails are eligible for adoption and many have adopters at this time. The County is always in need of additional adopters. Most non-motorized trails have been adopted but currently there are many motorized trails that still need adopters. HRC encourages individuals to find a trail that they love and then volunteer to become the adopter. Contact the HRC Forestry Department at: (541) 387-6888 for trail adopter information.

OPERATOR REQUIREMENTS

Off-Highway motorcycle and ATV riding is an exciting and fun sport that comes with a certain level of risk. Hood River County requires that all OHV users follow state regulations and strongly encourages all riders to wear the proper protective equipment appropriate for their sport such as a helmet, goggles, gloves, chest protector, elbow and knee pads, shin guards, and boots. Riders should operate responsibly using properly maintained and equipped vehicles. It is unlawful to operate Off Highway Vehicles if your driving privileges are suspended or revoked.

TRAIL SIGNS

All OHV trails on the East Area Tree Farm that are open for use are marked with trail signs. Signs relay some or all of the following information: trail number, difficulty level, directional arrow, use designation, and trail status. Recreate on trails open to your type of use and that are appropriate for your skill level.




Many trails on adjacent ownerships are not shown because permission has not been granted for public use.
